Baseball players are known for having certain rituals or superstitions that they do before going up to bat. It may be wearing a favorite pair of socks, hitting the base three times with their bat, touching their arm in several places. Whatever it is, they think it helps them in their batting. Do bridge players also have certain procedures that are followed before starting a game?

Some things may be purely habit but other practices may be rooted in science. If you think it helps your game, you might as well do it! The operative word here is THINK. With all the variables in bridge it would probably be impossible to prove any of these things actually improves your game. The saying goes, "He who make the least mistakes, wins." Here are a few examples. Which are superstitions and which may have some validity? 1. Wearing a certain pair of socks or piece of jewelry

2. Drinking a cup of coffee or Coke for a caffeine "wake me up"

3. Shaking out your fingers, hands, and arms to relax

4. Saying "good luck" to the entire table

5. Tapping your head several times to get more blood flowing up there

6. Taking three deep breathes to relax (In-2-3-4, Hold, Out-2-3-4-5-6)

7. Going over your convention card with your partner no matter how often or seldom you play with that partner

8. Playing a few practice hands online before coming to the game

9. Closing your eyes and visualizing a good (maybe 7NT?) hand

10. Chewing gum (especially in the afternoon of an all-day Swiss game) 11. Doing a few bends and stretches in the parking lot before coming in 12. Having a lucky penny or some other talisman in your pocket

13. Touching your arm in three places like baseball player Garciaparra did (just kidding!)

14. Offering up a quick prayer

15. Always playing East/West (or always North/South)

16. Eating (or not eating) before a game

Master Point Races Explained

ACBL gives official recognition to the winners (who are ACBL members) of the most masterpoints in a calendar year in several different categories. Master Point races are the cummulative points within that year. Your category (Junior Master, Life Master, etc.) is established on January of that year. On-line "colorless" points are not included in the race.

Ace of Clubs

Recognition is given to players through the rank of Grand Life Master who earn the most masterpoints in club games during the calendar year. Most people think of this as black points.

Mini-McKenney

Recognition is given to players in each masterpoint category who win the most masterpoints during the calendar year.

2019 winners will be recognized at the April 2020 Unit Game.
