MEET THE MASTERS



Mel Feinberg Gold Life Master

Mel Fineberg is a new addition to Long Beach Bridge Center. After living in Las Vegas for the past 18 years, he recently returned to Southern California to live closer to his grandkids, 4-year old twins, Caleb and Stella, who live in Los Alamitos. With 2,526 masterpoints to date,

Mel became a Gold Life Master while playing in a club game here on March 3rd!

When visiting in 2019 to await the birth of his grandchildren at Long Beach Memorial, Mel discovered Long Beach Bridge. He added, "I played at the club three days. I enjoyed it so much that, when I moved here, I joined this unit even though I live in Huntington Beach."

Mel was introduced to bridge early on, in the 1950's. His father was an expert bridge player who competed against Charles Goren in national tournaments as well as founding and running the only bridge club in Flint, Michigan. His father taught Mel and his brother the basics of bridge, and they competed in several local sectionals during junior high. As a high school sophomore Mel organized an after-school bridge club with three or four tables where his father taught bridge and supervised their game.

From there Mel attended Michigan State, majoring in economics. He graduated in 1969, was immediately drafted, and spent two years in the army. He explained, "After my discharge, I still had the itch to be single and have fun so I traveled the country and worked odd jobs." In 1972 he settled in the San Francisco Bay area and began his career appraising machinery in 1975.

Transferred to the Los Angeles office in 1977, he lived in Van Nuys but worked downtown so, once a week, he played at the Westwood Bridge Club. Then Mel met his wife and focused on raising their family of two children, a son and daughter. After working 20 years for a national company, Mel started his own appraisal company in 1994.

In 2004, Mel faced a watershed moment in life. His wife passed away too young, and both children were out

No Risk It: No Biscuit

When Cherene Birkholz of Long Beach read an email from ACBL announcing the National Spring Bridge Championship in New Orleans in March, she wasn't intimidated by the thought of international players, possibly 6000 tables, and no partner. It was suggested that perhaps a third of those tables would be for novices. and they could assign her a partner of equal (lack of) experience. And after all, it was in New Orleans, a city she loved! "We're going to New Orleans," she told her husband.

At the Partnership Desk after check-in, Cherene filled out a form with questions about how long she'd been playing (less than a year) and how many points she had (zero). She had started bridge with Hank's class in Bridge One in June 2022, made flash cards to help her

remember bidding rules, and frequently played a bridge app on her phone. But a novice she was. She was assigned a partner from Massachusetts. Her partner played standard, and she played 2 over 1, but they worked it out.

On Friday, the tournament offered players with 0-5 points free play in the 0-299er games. Cherene and her new partner played for four hours. Cherene said Friday was a total disaster. That's all she would say other than there was another free game after lunch which they chose to skip. "My brain hurt."

On Saturday, there was a free lesson in Suit Defense for players with 0-20 points in the morning and free boards to play after the lesson. This time, she and her partner came in fourth and won half a point.

On Sunday morning, there was another free lesson. "I think it was about End Plays," she said, "but it was over my head." And this time, they came in first playing the free boards after the lesson. Ultimately, she left New Orleans with two red points.

"It's strange, but I feel I'm a much better bridge player having done the tournament. Maybe it was exposure to so many different hands."

"I've created a monster," Hank was heard to say.

of the house in college. Mel decided to change up his life and pursue his other passions, photography and travel. He spent two weeks in Europe and returned on the Queen Mary II. Mel recalled, "It rained the whole trip so, with nothing else to do, I ventured into a bridge game. After 25 years of no bridge, I attended the class on the boat and learned how to use a bidding box."

On returning home, Mel took up bridge again and moved to Las Vegas where he could work and play duplicate bridge in the evenings. He noted, "It was hard to find partners when I first arrived, so I was passed around among several players. Eventually four of us started playing seriously and decided we wanted to play tournament bridge." Their team traveled from Las Vegas to Phoenix, Denver, and Southern California—playing team games and amassing masterpoints. Once a Palm Springs tournament had three team games a day, and they played all of them!

Mel's first bridge goal was "to become a Life Master before I turned 65." He achieved it during a Las Vegas sectional in 2012. Needing only 0.22 of a masterpoint to achieve Gold Life Master, Mel's partner canceled their game. He rustled up a substitute and they scored a second place, earning 1.05 masterpoints thus



I Want You to Be a Director

What does it take to be a good club director? These are the essential requirements:

- * Knowledge and understanding of the Laws of Duplicate Bridge and ACBL regulations.
- * Ability to work with required software and hardware.
- * Public relations skills to balance the roles of referee, judge, teacher, psychologist and entertainment director.

Preparation

You can prepare for this exam by studying on your own or by enrolling in the Club Directors Course. It is an open-book, online test. You must answer at least 65 percent of the questions correctly to pass the test and become a certified ACBL Club Director.
