


Jane Reid is a Ruby Life Master, amassing 1,676 masterpoints since playing duplicate bridge from 2008.

A native of Indiana and graduate of Purdue University, Jane still recalls her initial interview with the dean of Engineering who told her, "Nice girls like you
don't make good engineers." She became a Boilermaker but majored in mathematics instead. "Seeking adventure" after graduation, Jane moved to California in 1968, accepting a job with Long Beach Unified School District where she taught mathematics for 30 years. Jane met Jerry, her husband of 55 years, here when she and a group of friends went to a singles bar for a night of fun and socializing. She added, "It was the best decision of my life."
For the first ten years of her career, Jane taught middle school math. As there were no women teaching high school math at that time, she was encouraged to apply to do so. Accepted the next year to teach at Milliken High School, Jane remained there and served as department chair until 1997 when she moved to the LBUSD Math Office to train and coach teachers. Her two daughters-ages 5 and 8 when she first start-
ed at Milliken— eventually attended high school with her. "I loved all my years of teaching. It was special to be at the same school with my girls because then I knew all their friends."

Having been introduced to bridge in college, Jane played socially once a month with eight friends who would "drink wine, play bridge, and visit." After she retired in 2000, one of them said, "Now that you're retired, you need to learn how to play bridge." Their whole groupincluding Colleen Gardner and Joyce Hendersonstarted taking lessons from Bob Mault and Jane added, "I really got hooked. Bob was a wonderful teacher who was very patient even when we all talked at once and struggled with reverses." Jane had continued consulting in math at a different high school but, after four years, she quit doing that "to have more time for bridge and golf."

But it was always the catching, not the having. Hank explained, "I don't need to fish anymore. I'll fish because I want to, but I don't NEED to fish anymore." The tuna was donated to the Japanese Community in West Covina.

To this day, Jane does just that as her partners can attest from her postmortem notes to them. She added, "I feel fortunate to have had such good partners who make playing bridge enjoyable."

Jane enjoys playing conventions but thinks play of the hand is a more important part of the game, but it is difficult to learn as it takes lots of experience.
Jane and Jerry are very close to their two daughters though they live far away, one in Portland with two teenagers and the other in the Bay Area with one son. Jane added, "Fortunately they love getting together so we see them three or four times a year."
