One Partner or Several?



This month, we're talking about partnerships. Whether one partner or several, the main idea is to build partnerships that work and win games. We discussed this topic with Bob Bauman, Dan Frank, Darrell and Jane Manson, Deke Thomas, Del Stewart, Jerome Shiohama, Laura Breen, Lynda Montgomery, Marty Shobar, Mony Barkol, Sally Baker, Sue Reininger, and Terry Royce, all NLM or "morning" people. This article may remind Big Pool partners of their beginnings and their working out the pros and cons of partnerships, whether single or multiple.

Question: How did you happen to partner together?

- * We met in Hank's class, so we have a similar background. It was a natural choice.
- * I lost my long-term partner to

illness. I knew my new partner from playing against her. We've played together three times now, and it's getting better all the time. *We were playing with two others but were not partnered together. Her partner moved to the Big Pool; mine dropped bridge totally, so we partnered together.

*I often came solo and played with different other singles. After a few times, my current partner and I partnered together. We haven't come solo since then.

Question: What are the pros and cons of playing with a single partner?

- * Playing with the same partner is knowing what he'll do and what conventions we play.
- * We can talk about hands after play and nail down partnership agreements and systems.
- * Playing with my husband only? He is never a no-show. Playing only with my wife? She lets me go home with her no matter how badly I've played. Of course, she remembers how badly I've played.
- * I do better with a consistent partner. She knows what to do, what leads I want. It's like telepathy.

Question: What are the pros and cons of playing with

multiple partners?

- * One partner teaches me a convention, and I teach it to another partner later in the week. Teaching is a great learning experience.
- * I can't work my schedule with one partner, so I have several and can play as often as I like. * It's essential that we have
- discussions with new partners before play. So, when Rob asks that dreaded question, "What is your partnership agreement?", we don't look like deer in the headlights.

Question: What if you're a fill-in player?

Lynda Montgomery: Pro: No one can get mad when you make mistakes or make a bid they don't understand. Con: Often, there is no time to talk. Being a fill-in is like always being on a blind date.

Per an Internet quote: "Coming together is a beginning, staying together is progress, and working together is success." That's what morning players are learning to do, just as Big Pool players have already mastered.

Zero Tolerance

Long Beach Bridge Center bills itself as the friendliest bridge club. But is it? In the upcoming editions of Table Talk, we will highlight ACBL policy and suggest some recommended behaviors. First ACBL's Zero Tolerance (Z-T) Policy:

The ultimate purpose of the Z-T policy is to create a much more pleasant atmosphere. We are attempting to eradicate unacceptable behavior in order to make the game of bridge more enjoyable for all. Some examples of commendable behavior, which, while not required, will significantly contribute to the improved

atmosphere:

- Being a good "host" or "guest" at the table.
- Greeting others in a friendly manner.
- Praising the bidding and/or play of the opponents.
- Having two clearly completed convention cards readily available to the opponents. (This one is a regulation, not just a nicety. "Yellow card convention cards are available to those without cards.) The following are examples of behavior that will not be tolerated:
- Badgering, rudeness, insinuations, intimidation, profanity, threats or violence.
- Negative comments concerning opponents' or partner's play or bidding.
- Constant and gratuitous lessons and analyses at the table.
- Loud and disruptive arguing with a director's ruling.
 If a player at the table behaves in an unacceptable manner, the director should be called immediately.
